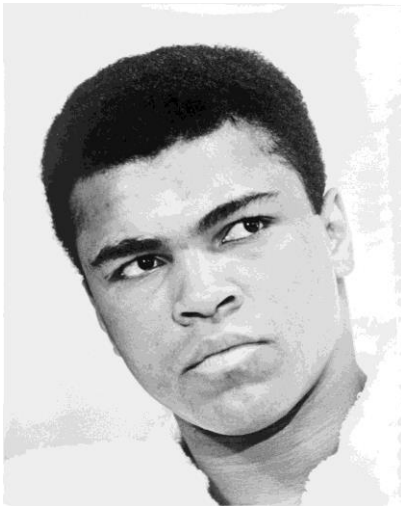
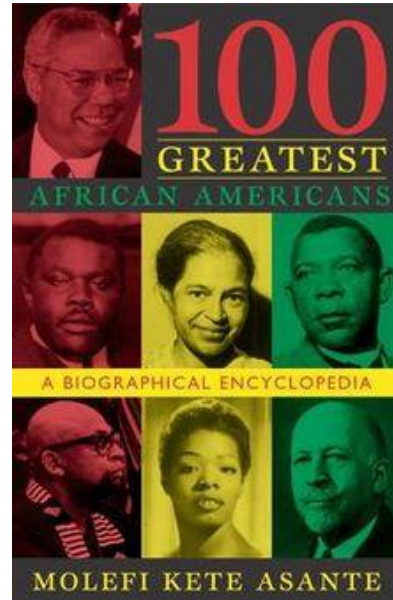
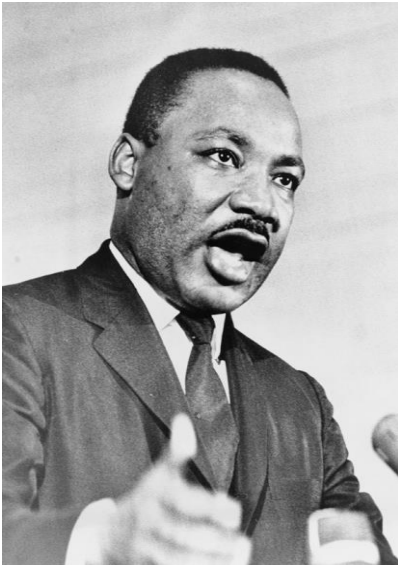

Scrapbook Details

Directions: Now that you have gathered your information, it is time to put the research in your scrapbook. Your scrapbook must include:

- **Cover**

The cover must include their full name and at least one picture. Your first and last name should be in the lower right hand corner.

- **Table of Contents**

This should be the first page in your scrapbook. Title it "Table of Contents" and include the following sections and the corresponding page numbers. Pictures optional.

- **Life** (3 – 4 pages)

This section should include 3 - 4 pages. Each page should include at least one paragraph and one text feature. One text feature should be a picture with a caption. Sample ideas: Page 1-Childhood, Page 2-Family, Page 3-Education, Page 4-Adulthood/Career.

- **Perseverance** (1 page)

This page should include the obstacles they faced in their life. Explain how they overcame or persevered through their obstacles. You need at least one paragraph and one text feature.

- **Greatest Accomplishments** (1 page)

This page should include their greatest accomplishment(s). This should be what made them famous. You need at least one paragraph and at least one text feature about their greatest accomplishment(s).

- **Adjective Collage** (1 page)

Use at least ten adjectives describing this person and their achievements. Include at least one picture.

- **Timeline** (1 page)

Create a timeline of the major events in this person's life.

- **Bibliography** (1 page)

Cite the sources you used during this research project.

Things to Keep in Mind

- Information can be hand written or typed.
- Text features include: photos, maps, charts, tables, diagrams, sidebars (extra information box), bold words with definitions, graphs, etc.
- **Writing must be in your own words!**
- Pictures can be drawn or printed out from the computer.
- Use color to create eye-catching pages.
- You can use scrapbook paper if you choose.
- Bind the scrapbook together in a **sturdy way!**

How to Cite Your Sources

Author's last name, Author's first name (period at the end)

A book with one author:

Title (underlined with a period at the end)

Keller, Helen. Helen Keller: The Story of my Life. New York: Watermill, 1980.

City, state, or country where book is published (followed by a colon)

Publisher, Year book was published (period)

Authors' names in the order they appear on the title page. Only the first author's name goes last name, first name. Put commas between each author's name and a period at the end of the list.

A book with two or more authors:

The rest of the citation works the same as a book with one author.

Smith, Arnold, Steve Jones, and Ken Anderson. Thomas Jefferson. CA: Puffin, 1993.

Encyclopedia Articles:

Author's name: Last name, first name.

Title of article in quotation marks (period at the end)

Block, Judy. "George Washington." World Book. New York: Macmillan, 2004.

Title of book (underlined with a period at the end)

City, state, or country where book is published (followed by a colon)

Publisher, Year published (period)

Website:

Title of the site (underlined with a period at the end)

The address of the website inside of < > (period at the end)

The Anthony Trial: An Account. Douglas Linder. 2001. 18 December 2010 <<http://www.law.com/anthonytrial>>.

Date the site was published (period at the end)

If any of this information is not given, simply leave it out.

Date you found the site (no period)
